2.Issue of copyright ownership







- ➤ Cultural Protocols are emerging and growing in importance in many industries, including the Arts, Museums and Galleries, Research, Libraries and Archives, Development and business.
- ➤ Cultural Protocols:
 - are effective and respectful frameworks for using ICIP and for engaging with Indigenous people and communities;
 - go beyond the law to respect Indigenous peoples' rights and cultural differences;
 - encourage ethical conduct and promote interaction based on good faith and mutual respect.






Maintaining Indigenous Culture

Recognition and Protection


Australian policy and law should be used to recognise and protect ICIP rights. For example, copyright laws, protocols and contracts can be used to help ensure ICIP recognition and protection.




State legislation and policy has an essential supporting role to play in language projects
